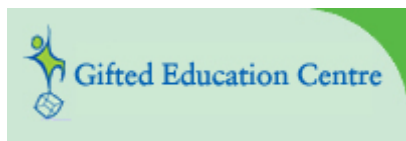


WORKING TOGETHER FOR GIFTED AWARENESS WEEK

Established in 1995 as the George Parkyn National Centre for Gifted Education, the Centre supports gifted children, their families, teachers and schools through a variety of initiatives. The One Day School (ODS) programme operates in 8 regions (North and South Island), for children aged from 6 - 13, Gifted Online (GO) caters for children unable to attend ODS and the Small Poppies programme works with children from 2.5 - 6 years of age in Auckland, Christchurch and Nelson. Professional development programmes are designed for schools, teacher training given at both preschool and primary school level, and parent workshops are offered.

REACH Education specialises in providing professional development in gifted education. It offers the Certificate in Effective Practice in Gifted Education, a semester-length online course with a strong focus on first gaining insight into the world of the gifted child and then developing practical strategies relevant to the teacher's own situation. The course is open to teachers at every level of schooling. REACH also offers a range of practical short workshops for teachers and parents which can tour to different parts of the country, organises events such as the recent Reaching Forward national conference and visits to this country by international experts in the field, and supports individual schools through mentoring, programme review, and similar activities.

University on Wheels is a joint venture organised by Jean Hendy Harris (Holiday Seminars) and Elaine Le Sueur, (Gifted Education consultant), offering a range of workshops for tall poppies, high fliers, rising stars, odd bods, creative thinkers, bright sparks and gifted and talented students. Set up in the early 1990s, Jean's Holiday Seminars have catered for thousands of students travelling to Auckland for extension opportunities. These have proved to be so popular that the non-profit trust is expanding to include day time seminars hosted in school time. The focus is on students who require more intellectual challenge than is easily provided for in the regular classroom. Each full day seminar takes the place of the student's regular classroom programme for the day that they are enrolled.
